<u>Course Description</u>: Digital anthropology is the study of how digital technology affects human culture. This course introduces students to the theories and methods necessary for doing research in a digital space. Students will learn both how to use ethnographic methods in a digital space and how to use digital technology to conduct traditional ethnographies. In addition, the course will consider the ethical challenges of studying human interactions within these translocal digital technologies.
